SPAN 2311 and 2312, or Spanish CLEP, or Spanish AP, or four years of high school Spanish. Native speakers with instructor's approval.

Course Catalog Description:

The course presents a variety of topics related to Hispanic culture. The approach is thematic rather than purely historical, and the topics have been chosen both for the insights that they offer into Hispanic culture and for the interest to the student.

Course overview:

This course has been designed to reinforce the development of reading, writing, and speaking skills, to build vocabulary, and to stimulate critical thinking. The goal is to present materials that enable the students to develop effective communicative skills in Spanish and motivate them to find out more about the target culture and to express ideas in Spanish. Writing skills will be refined by the completion of research papers, and communication skills will be developed further by class discussions and presentations. Comprehension will be enhanced by presenting students with literary texts, films, documentaries, and periodicals. The course is conducted entirely in Spanish.

Measurable Learning Objectives and Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. determine and evaluate the history of the region in the context of the social, political, economic, and cultural experiences that have contributed to the development of Spain and Latin America through Skype sessions.

2. discuss, identify and reflect on the history, customs, values and other cultural aspects of Spain and Latin America in writing assignments and discussion forums.

3. analyze the perceptions, points of view, and life experiences of people in Spain and/or Latin America in a cultural context in research papers, a video presentation, and a final project.

LINGUISTIC OBJECTIVES:

- interpret and analyze main and secondary ideas from oral and written cultural texts produced in Spain and Latin America.

- summarize, describe, and comment clearly and in a structured way historical, political, and sociocultural texts at an advanced level.

- participate in conversations about different topics in a comprehensible way at an advanced level.

- think critically and express personal opinions orally and in written at an advanced level.

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS:

Students will complete reports, narrative responses, answer questionnaires, or carry out research on various topics (at least two per module). Research assignments are intended to provide you with the opportunity to more fully explore our class discussion topics, as well as examine it from a more empirical perspective. Details of the requirements for the assignments will be available on Canvas.

VIDEO-PRESENTATION:

Students are required to prepare one oral presentation throughout the course. (Dates, topics and instructions will be posted in Canvas). All students will prepare one report on a topic assigned by the professor. Students will prepare a narrated power-point that will be converted into a video-presentation. This presentation will be made available for the rest of the students in Canvas.

DISCUSSION FORUMS:

There are one or two Discussion Board forums per module. The purpose of all Discussion Board forums is to generate interaction among students regarding relevant current course topics. Guidelines will be posted in Canvas.

FINAL PROJECT:

Students will complete a research assignment that involve interactions with the Hispanic local community. They will present their findings in a form of a narrated power point presentation. The entire assessment will be based on the quality of the presentation as defined in the rubric given to students.

Communication, Grading & Feedback: You may reach me by Canvas/Inbox or in my office during my office hours. Messages will be replied within 48 hours. Assignments will be graded within a week after the deadline. I will provide feedback through Canvas.

Time Management: A student should expect to spend three hours on preparation and learning assignments for every semester credit hour. If a class is a 3-semester credit hour class, it is expected that a student should spend about 8-10 hours per week to obtain an "A" in a class. It is important to develop a Time Management Plan to be successful.

Policies

1. **Discussion Board:** Discussion Board is primarily for discussing course related topics and issues. Best practices are:
 1. Read all message postings in online discussion.

2. Respond to the question directly
 3. Reply to minimum of two other student posts.
 4. Use a person's name in the body of your message when you reply to their message.
 5. Avoid postings that are limited to 'I agree' or 'great idea', etc.
 6. Ensure responses to questions are meaningful, reflective.
 7. Support statements with concepts from course readings, refer to personal experience, examples.
 8. Follow **Rules of Behavior**.
2. **Rules of Behavior:** Discussion areas are public to every student in this class (including your instructor) who will see what you write. Please pay attention to the language you use and adhere to the following guidelines:
1. Do not post anything too personal.
 2. Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial in regard to gender, race, or ethnicity.
 3. Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
 1. Be courteous and respectful to other people on the list
 2. Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging. Some of the list participants may not be familiar with acronyms.
 3. Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
 4. Write your full name at the end of the posting.
 5. Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.
2. **Make-Up/Late Submission Policy:**
All course activities must be submitted before or on set due dates and times. If the student is unable to abide by the due dates and times, it is her/his responsibility to contact the instructor immediately and before the due date. No late work will be accepted. There are no extra assignments for extra credits in this course.
3. **Academic Dishonesty/Plagiarism/Cheating:** The academic community regards academic dishonesty as an extremely serious matter, with serious consequences. Any effort to gain an advantage not given to all students is dishonest whether or not the effort is successful. Any suspicion of academic dishonesty will be reported and investigated. A student who engages in scholastic dishonesty that includes, but is not limited to cheating, plagiarism, and collusion will receive an "F" for the course.

All persons involved in academic dishonesty will be disciplined in accordance with University

4. **Attendance and Class Participation:** Regular and active participation is an essential, unmistakably important aspect of this online course. Students will log on a minimum of three times every seven days. All students are expected to do the work assigned, notify the instructor when emergencies arise.
5. **Tracking:** The learning management systems have a tracking feature. Statistics are collected that quantifies how often and when students are active in the course and provides information if the student has accessed different pages of the course.
6. **Absenteeism:** All the course activities have set dates to be completed and submitted. After the due dates the activities will not be available for the students. Not logging into an online course is considered absenteeism. Contact instructor immediately in case of emergency medical situation.
7. **Course Incomplete/Withdrawal/Grade Appeal:**
All students are required to complete the course within the semester they are signed up. Incomplete grades for the course are rarely given, will only be granted if the student provides a valid, documented excuse for not being able to complete the course on time, and has contacted the instructor prior to the scheduled last class to request an extension. The student signs a contract that includes the incomplete course activities and the new due dates.

Online Student Authentication
